Dear Parent(s)/Guardian(s),

Attached you will find the 2007-2008 Report Card for West Elementary School. The publication of this report card is required by the federal law, “No Child Left Behind” (NCLB), which President Bush signed on January 8, 2002. This law mandates that the results of the Mississippi Grade Level Testing Program (grades 3 - 8) be published in annual state, district, and school report cards. This information will allow parents to measure the performance and progress of their child’s school, district, and state.

Student achievement is reported on the Mississippi Grade Level Testing Program by scale score and proficiency levels. The proficiency levels are as follows:

Advanced	Student consistently performs in a manner clearly beyond that required to be successful at the next grade.
Proficient	Student demonstrates solid academic performance and mastery of the content area knowledge and skills required for success at the next grade. Students who perform at this level are prepared to begin work on even more challenging material that is required at the next grade.
Basic	Student demonstrates partial mastery of the content area knowledge and skills required for success at the next grade. Remediation may be necessary for these students.
Minimal	Student is below basic and does not demonstrate mastery of the content area knowledge and skills required for success at the next grade. These students require additional instruction and remediation in the basic skills that are necessary for success at the grade tested.

In an effort to describe the performance of the students in our school, we have provided you with a snapshot of their academic performance on the Grade Level Testing Program. Where appropriate, we have included scale scores and proficiency level distributions in grades 3 through 5 for our elementary school in the areas of reading-language arts, science, and mathematics. This report indicates how different groups of students performed on the MCT2 last spring. We have also included other data that will give you a more comprehensive view of our school. Should you have any questions about the information contained in this report card, please call the school or speak to your child’s teacher.

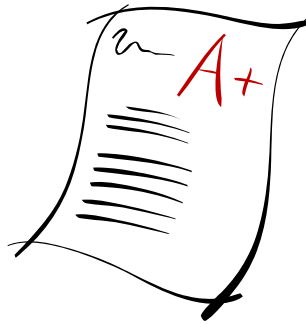

- (3) The SATP Algebra I and English II MC tests were revised for 2007-2008, so the results of those tests are not directly comparable to results in 2006-2007.
- (4) The proficiency standards on the MAAECF were reset for 2007-2008, so the results on that assessment are not directly comparable to the results in 2006-2007.
