<u>credential</u> – n. a quality, skill, or experience that makes a person suited to do a job. The job applicant listed his credentials on his resume.

<u>credible</u> – adj. able to be believed; reasonable to trust or believe. The policeman interviewed a credible witness.

<u>creditor</u> – n. a person, bank, or company that lends money to someone. The college student borrowed money from a creditor to buy a car.

<u>creed</u> – n. a statement of the basic beliefs of a religion; an idea or set of beliefs that guides the actions of a person or group. Our family's creed has been passed down from several generations.

incredulous – adj. not able or willing to believe something; feeling or showing a lack of belief. I was incredulous as I listened to him tell his side of the story.

Prefix

<u>displace</u> – v. to take the job or position of someone or something; to force people or animals to leave the area where they live; to move something so that it is no longer in its original or regular location. Younger workers have displaced many older, more expensive employees.

<u>disgrace</u> – v. to cause someone to feel ashamed; to cause someone or something to lose or become unworthy of respect or approval. The awful scandal disgraced everyone who worked in the governor's office.

<u>decode</u> – v. to find or understand the true or hidden meaning of something; to change (secret messages, documents) from a set of letters, numbers, and/or symbols you cannot understand into words you can understand. I was unable to decode her true feelings from reading her letter.

<u>deprive</u> – v. to take something away from someone or something; to not allow to have or keep something. The doctor would never intentionally deprive his patient of treatment.

<u>decline</u> – v. to become lower in amount or less in number; to become worse in condition or quality; Unfortunately, the patient's health continued to decline. to say that you will not or cannot do something. I will have to decline the invitation to Kathy's wedding since we are going on vacation that week.
